
From the President – Heather Welsh

A bitterly cold Winter and COVID precautions have meant that many of us have been living in comparative isolation which has led to a flowering of creativity. Members have produced some exquisite cards for the Moongala project, some of them are reproduced at the end of this Newsletter.

It is gratifying to see that all GEAS activities have resumed including the first Professional Development workshop during Studio Art exclusively for members. An all-day weekend Professional Development Day will be held on Saturday, 22 October which will be open to non-members at a slightly higher price. Full details will be provided in the near future.

As more members expressed the desire to be involved in selecting exhibition themes, the Committee adopted an inclusive approach and circulated a list of six proposed themes, inviting all the members to indicate their preferences. The one with the highest number of votes will be adopted as the 2023 exhibition theme.

The Committee also accepted the proposal that it is time for GEAS to include adjudicated awards for the exhibition and will now turn its collective mind as to how this is to be done and the sourcing of the prizes. To ensure that this does not become a divisive issue, the proposed format will be put to the vote at the AGM for members to decide how they want adjudicated awards to be handled. Rotary Club of Caulfield will still handle the Peoples' Choice Awards.

Members will recall that GEAS supported the Anthony Breslin Murrumbena Mural with a sponsorship of \$1,000. The mural is now finished,

including solar powered lighting with some money to spare. This left over money will be used by the Rotary Club of Caulfield to repair some faulty lights.

Member Profile – Margaret Bellamy

In 1958 Margaret and her husband Cliff came to Sydney where she taught in a secondary school and he did further study. In 1961 his work brought them to Melbourne and soon an academic career at Monash while Margaret looked after their growing family.



Margaret Bellamy – “Hard Edged Optical Illusions”

As a child Margaret had always drawn and had been encouraged by her architect father. They often went to Auckland Art Gallery and she had her favourite paintings. She had always planned to go to Art school. Instead, she gained a B.A. in English and History and stopped drawing.


During those domestic years she resumed drawing, especially on camping holidays and visiting the growing number of galleries and soon the new NGV. She educated herself by reading widely and taking short courses, mostly art related. The creative urge was satisfied in typical ways of the day: sewing, knitting, gardening and cooking.

The family of six lived in London for three months followed by a year in Los Angeles in 1969, going via NZ to see family, and fitting in an amazing amount on four brief stopovers. California and beyond provided excellent camping in State and National Parks with spectacular landscapes. Once home they moved house and Margaret returned to teaching, taking leave of absence in 1976 for another year in Los

Angeles and at last, formal art training in Life Drawing and Painting at Saddleback Community College.

Teaching resumed and brushes put down except for a two-week painting trip to Kakadu with Keith Looby as tutor.

1985 brought long service leave spent mostly in Europe, and diary keeping became part of travelling thereafter. 1994 saw the end of 22 years at Korowa. The next year brought two weddings (planned) and a stint in hospital (unplanned). Once recovered, Margaret started classes at the Melbourne School of Art in Elsternwick with Patrick Moss and Adrian Crevatin, But, in 1997 her husband died after a long illness. Three weeks later she became a grandmother.



Now painting and travelling widely became part of rebuilding her life. She has been to more than 40 countries finding that sketching while moving sharpened skills and had advantages over photos. Her visual diaries multiplied as they recorded details and moments, and the essence of a culture in a few seconds. In 1999 she had a solo Exhibition at Inverloch where nearly half the paintings sold. A rush of grandchildren curtailed things for several years until she took portraiture classes with Lee Makelak and others in abstraction. Since then, she has been part of group Exhibition at Meenyan, the odd church fete, the Lyceum Club and all GEAS exhibitions.

Margaret joined the Glen Eira Artists Society after Patrick Moss introduced her to Lilian Weinberg, one of the Society's founders, who was looking to expand the then new art group. She has immersed herself in many of the Society's activities, as a member of the Exhibition sub-committee, Convenor of Studio Art and the organisation of Professional Development events. A versatile artist her works reveal a wide range of influences and subject matter.

A tower of strength, Margaret remains positive in times of adversity. With seven grandchildren, and

many interests, there is always some time to paint and try something new.

From Around the World

Did you know that South Korea is actually one of the best countries in the world to explore by bicycle, and almost no one knows, not even cyclists? Whether you are looking for a short route near Seoul or an end-to-end route, South Korea has them both.

In the past few decades South Korea has built a massive cycling infrastructure, including a network of cross-country bike paths. You read that right – 'bike only' paths that span the length of the country. These routes are a mix of well-maintained paths through parks and along rivers, quiet country trails, and small roads; and the vast majority of the paths, barring mountain passes and remote areas, are car-free.

The most incredible one is the over 30km path that runs down the middle of a six-lane highway that connects the cities of Daejeon and Sejong. Along the whole stretch of the lane, cyclists are nicely protected from the weather by solar panels that also generate clean electricity all day long.




With cyclists' safety in mind, the designers included a number of underground crossings that allow cyclists to reach the lane safely, without having to cross the busy highway.

Although **seven in 10 Koreans own a bicycle**, cycling popularity is limited to leisure and sport purposes only. The public is yet to take up cycling as a means of transport with similar enthusiasm.
