
From the President – Mary Lewin

Member Profile – Elizabet Coyle

Liz's love of animals is abundantly clear from her works. Her effective use of colour coupled with strong influences from classical and aboriginal art combine to create a truly unique style. Her cats in particular are wonderfully whimsical.

Liz was born in Brazil and grew up on a farm that had a sawmill and ran cattle as



well. At some point the farm was converted to a coffee plantation. She was 14 at the time and remembers helping her parents in planting the coffee seedlings – a backbreaking undertaking. Once the trees matured, she took part in the harvesting, roasting and grinding of the beans – all done manually – and eventually drinking her own brewed coffee.

Growing up on a remote farm she attended a small local school that accommodated all ages in one classroom, where only basic subjects were taught. Art was not one of them. But with no access to toys, Liz had to use her creative mind and make her own toys from local resources as well as drawing with her pack of 6 colouring pencils.

Liz qualified as a dentist and practiced from her own dental surgery. Art started to feature in her life through friends who were deeply immersed in the art world. Spurred by them she enrolled in an art course at the Universidad Federal do Espirito Santo.

She married Martin, an Englishman who could not adjust to the Brazilian way of life. As Liz found living in the UK hard, the compromise was migrating to Australia in 1989. Their daughter Daniela is a 'true blue' Aussie. As is the experience of many migrants, she could not practice dentistry as her qualifications did not meet the Australian requirements. However, she was able to work as a Dental Hygienist, and did so from 1990 to 2016 when she ceased her dental career due to some health issues.

Her inspiration to start painting and drawing came from a display of children drawings at an Osteopath clinic. From there she went to the nearest '2 Dollar' shop and bought cheap art materials, thus launching her career as an artist. She started with small canvases, experimenting and gradually developing her unique style. Liz is also adept at sculpture, something she discovered when in Thailand and was impressed by papier mâché artworks. Once her talent was noticed by the arts teachers at Wesley College in St Kilda, Liz became a demonstrator as well as an artist in residence in 2017/2018.

Liz is a prolific artist and participated in many exhibitions, including The Convent Gallery in Daylesford, the former 247 gallery in Glen Huntly, Wearable Art Exhibition in Frankston, as well as GEAS and Cityscape exhibitions. As a flow on from the GEAS "Water" exhibition, she was commissioned to do a work titled "Coexistence" that depicts harmonious living between Israelis and Palestinians.

Animals and pets feature greatly in her life and currently she has two cats, a 20 year old male tabby called Maximus, and an 8 years old female cat called Lola who was found in Laverton as an abandoned kitten.

Others who do not actually have a cat themselves started forwarding more cat videos and also semi adopted the cats of neighbours. Artists took solace in their moggies and also as artistic inspiration. One artist did a cat creation almost every day. Another a watercolour of a Kung Fu cat leaping through the air, Bruce Lee style, with a Kung Fu sword, slicing the Covid virus in half. Where did this lead me?

Well, the Director of the Glen Eira City Council Gallery has advised that – "Your mini exhibition COVID Cats to be presented by the Rotary Club of Caulfield has been approved. Your exhibition will take place in the Gallery annexe during 23 September - 17 October 2021."

This is going to be so much fun. The Club has called for the submission of images. Like previous RCC exhibitions, the images will be received on-line and all Club members will vote on which will be accepted. As the Gallery Annex is small, we will have to be selective.

I applied for a grant to cover costs, including for a videographer to interview folk about the impact of cats on their lives during lockdown which will be played on a continuous loop for the exhibition.

Member Profile – Claud Bennie



Claud Bennie is current President of the Rotary Club of Caulfield, and former GEAS President. He is very coy about his artistic achievements even though he won a number of international photography awards. His landscape and seascape photos attest to a kin eve and a sense of place. Claud joined GEAS in 2017 and became its President in 2018.

Born in Benoni, a former gold mining town east of Johannesburg, South Africa, as a child and a young adult he experienced the draconian Apartheid regime. As a high school student, he developed a strong dislike of Afrikaans Nationalism, a dislike that grew stronger when he was studying teaching. He attended political meetings of one of the Opposition parties and was a vocal critic of the regime, activities that led to the police investigating him and tapping his phone. As this was a time when people were 'disappearing', never to be seen again, he was acutely aware of the need to be circumspect about his political connections.

Unhappy with the Apartheid education system, he left teaching and obtained further qualifications becoming an Associate of the Chartered Insurance Institute in London. From a humble start as an insurance clerk, he was fast-tracked to an executive position to become the company's youngest international Claims Superintendent.

I think I would be remiss if I did not include this vignette. Claud was the organizer of an insurance conference in Johannesburg when he was approached by an elderly man and they conversed together. That man was Nelson Mandela who by then was a free man, and that conversation became the key discussion topic of the delegates for the duration of the conference.

Claud was keenly involved in a variety of sports and won awards - a Certificate from the Amateur Weightlifting Association in 1983, and a number of the Argus Cycle Tours 105km awards over a few years before coming to Australia in 1997.

Like many people in South Africa, Claud and his wife Elizabeth migrated to Australia in 1997, both for political reasons and Elizabeth's desire to reconnect with her Australian heritage. And like many South Africans they lived in Perth until they moved to Melbourne in 2000. New beginnings in Australia led him to a new career path. Being an active sportsman, he decided to study *Remedial Massage* and also obtained a *Certificate in Personal Training and Fitness* that focused on Exercise in Chronic Health conditions. Sadly, Elizabeth passed away a few years ago.

His interests are extensive and include volunteering (Rotary Club of Caulfield, Bentleigh Bayside Community Health), and has traveled extensively to the UK, Europe, India, Nepal, Vietnam and Cambodia.
